

5.1 **6230.0500 GENERAL REGULATIONS FOR CONTROLLED HUNTING ZONES**
5.2 **AND DESIGNATED HUNTING STATIONS IN STATE GAME REFUGES.**

5.3 The following regulations apply to all persons within a controlled hunting zone or in
5.4 designated hunting stations during the an open Canada goose seasons waterfowl season or
5.5 as otherwise specified in parts 6230.0600 to 6230.1100:

5.6 *[For text of item A, see Minnesota Rules]*

5.7 B. ~~Only one hunting group, consisting of no more than three hunters, may occupy~~
5.8 ~~a designated hunting station at a time.~~ Except for stations reserved for hunters with
5.9 disabilities, use of designated hunting stations is first-come, first-serve. A person may not
5.10 occupy a station that is posted closed.

5.11 C. ~~Persons occupying a hunting station must fulfill all license requirements to~~
5.12 ~~hunt waterfowl.~~

5.13 C. No trailers of any kind are allowed in designated parking lots. Hunters using
5.14 designated hunting stations must park their vehicles in provided parking areas or numbered
5.15 stalls. Designated parking areas may not be occupied between 10 p.m. and 5 a.m.

5.16 D. All persons hunting in controlled hunting zones or in designated hunting stations
5.17 must adhere to any additional regulations that apply.

5.18 ~~D. E.~~ A person may not leave any refuse, offal, or feathers on public lands in the
5.19 controlled hunting zone or in any parking lot.

5.20 ~~E. F.~~ Alcoholic beverages may not be consumed or possessed at any of the hunting
5.21 stations on public lands.

5.22 ~~F.~~ A person may not loiter in areas between the designated hunting stations on
5.23 public lands.

5.24 ~~G.~~ On public lands, dogs must be on a leash except within ten feet of stations or
5.25 while retrieving, and must be under control at all times.

6.1 H. ~~On public lands, after each party member has bagged a limit of Canada geese,~~
6.2 ~~or expended a limit of shells, the party must promptly leave the station.~~

6.3 I. ~~No trailers of any kind are allowed in designated parking lots.~~

6.14 ~~1/2 S 1/2) of Section 11,~~ the Northwest Quarter of the Southeast Quarter (NW 1/4 SE
6.15 1/4) of Section 20, Township 158 North, Range 41 West.

7.13 ~~the Saturday nearest October 1 to the Saturday nearest January 14~~ during the open seasons
7.14 prescribed in part 6240.0640, subpart 1, and from December 7, 2024, through January 20,
7.15 2025. Geese may be taken by falconry during any open goose season. Crows may be taken
7.16 by falconry during the open season. Falconry hours are from one-half hour before sunrise
7.17 to sunset, ~~except during the regular waterfowl season when falconry hours are the same as~~
7.18 ~~waterfowl shooting hours.~~

8.1 **6240.0200 GENERAL RESTRICTIONS FOR TAKING AND POSSESSION OF**
8.2 **MIGRATORY GAME BIRDS.**

8.3 Subpart 1. **Shooting hours.** Shooting hours for migratory waterfowl, coots, gallinules,
8.4 rails, and snipe are one-half hour before sunrise to sunset, except ~~as follows:~~ during the
8.5 early teal season from September 1 through September 5, when shooting hours are sunrise
8.6 to sunset for teal.

8.7 ~~A. on the opening day of the duck season, shooting hours begin at 9:00 a.m.; and~~

8.8 ~~B. from the opening day of the duck season to the Saturday nearest October 8,~~
8.9 ~~shooting hours end at 4:00 p.m.~~

8.10 Subp. 2. **Possession limits.** The possession limit is ~~twice~~ three times the daily limit,
8.11 except for rails where the daily and possession limits are the same. All restrictions specific
8.12 to a species or gender apply.

8.14 Subp. 4. **Use of motorized watercraft.** A person may use motorized watercraft in
8.15 the waterfowl feeding and resting area established on South Heron Lake during the goose
8.16 season ~~established in part 6240.1200.~~

8.18 Subp. 7. **Taking in open water.** A person may take migratory waterfowl, coots,
8.19 gallinules, rails, and snipe in open water on the following waters of Minnesota with the
8.20 restrictions given:

8.21 A. the area of the Mississippi River and backwaters within the boundary beginning
8.22 at the intersection of U.S. Highway 61 and the Minnesota border in Dakota County; thence
8.23 along U.S. Highway 61 to U.S. Highway 63; thence along U.S. Highway 61/63 to U.S.
8.24 Highway 61; thence along U.S. Highway 61 to U.S. Highway 14; thence along U.S. Highway
8.25 61/14 to Interstate 90; thence along Interstate 90/U.S. Highway 61/14 to State Trunk Highway

9.1 16; thence along State Trunk Highway (STH) 16 to STH 26; thence along STH 26 to the
9.2 state's southern boundary; thence along the southern boundary to the eastern boundary;
9.3 thence along the eastern boundary to the point of the beginning: hunting is allowed not more
9.4 than 100 feet from any shoreline, including islands, from boats that must be at anchor;

9.5 B. Lake Pepin, Lake of the Woods, and Lake Mille Lacs: hunting is allowed from
9.6 boats that must be at anchor; and

9.7 C. Lake Superior north and east of Minnesota/Park Point peninsula: hunting is
9.8 allowed from boats that must be at anchor.

9.9 Subp. 8. **Early teal season restrictions.** Within the boundaries of the Leech Lake
9.10 Indian Reservation, taking teal during the early teal season prescribed under subpart 1 is
9.11 prohibited within one-half mile of wild rice beds that are posted by Tribal authorities as
9.12 open to rice harvest.

9.13 Subp. 9. **Early teal season restrictions.** Within the boundaries of the White Earth
9.14 Indian Reservation, taking teal during the early teal season prescribed under subpart 1 is
9.15 prohibited on wild rice beds that are posted by Tribal authorities as open to rice harvest.

9.16 **6240.0250 TAKING MOURNING DOVES.**

9.17 Subpart 1. **Open season.** Mourning doves may be taken during the ~~60-day~~ 90-day
9.18 period beginning September 1.

9.20 **6240.0610 YOUTH WATERFOWL HUNTING DAY.**

9.21 Subpart 1. **Dates, eligibility, and license requirements.** Ducks, mergansers, coots,
9.22 moorhens, and ~~Canada~~ dark or light geese, as defined in part 6240.0950, subpart 2, may be
9.23 taken statewide on Youth Waterfowl Hunting ~~Day~~ Weekend, September 7 and 8, by resident
9.24 and nonresident hunters ~~15~~ 17 years of age or younger. An adult resident or nonresident
9.25 mentor 18 years of age or older, who is authorized by the youth's parent or guardian, must

10.1 accompany the youth hunter at all times during the hunt. The accompanying adult may not
10.2 hunt. No hunting license or state waterfowl stamps are required, except all youths age 16
10.3 and older must have a federal migratory bird stamp.

10.4 Subp. 2. **Shooting hours.** Shooting hours are one-half hour before sunrise to 4:00
10.5 ~~p.m~~ sunset.

10.6 Subp. 3. **Bag limits.** The daily bag limit for ducks, mergansers, coots, and moorhens
10.7 is as allowed by federal rule. The daily bag limit for geese is five ~~Canada~~ dark geese and
10.8 20 light geese, as defined under part 6240.0950, subpart 2.

10.9 **6240.0630 TAKING SANDHILL CRANE.**

10.10 Subpart 1. **Open season.** Sandhill cranes may be taken from September 14 through
10.11 October 20.

10.12 Subp. 2. **Shooting hours.** Shooting hours for sandhill cranes are one-half hour before
10.13 sunrise to sunset.

10.14 Subp. 3. **Open area; taking restrictions.**

10.15 A. Sandhill cranes may be taken only in the Northwest Goose Zone described in
10.16 part 6240.0860, subpart 1.

10.17 B. Sandhill cranes may be taken by bow and arrow or shotgun with nontoxic shot
10.18 approved by the United States Fish and Wildlife Service. A person may not take sandhill
10.19 cranes with a rifle or handgun.

10.20 Subp. 4. **License and requirements.**

10.21 A. Sandhill cranes may only be taken under:

10.22 (1) a valid permit to take sandhill cranes issued by the commissioner for a
10.23 fee of \$3; and

11.1 (2) a small-game license, unless exempted.

11.2 B. A hunter must have a license to take sandhill cranes in possession when taking
11.3 or possessing sandhill cranes.

11.4 C. A hunter must not have had small- or big-game hunting privileges revoked
11.5 within one year of purchasing a license to take sandhill cranes.

11.6 Subp. 5. **Bag limits.** A person may not take more than two sandhill cranes per day or
11.7 have more than six sandhill cranes in possession.

11.8 Subp. 6. **Penalties.** Violating this part or the conditions of any permit issued under
11.9 this part results in revocation of the license and any other penalty provided by state or federal
11.10 law.

11.11 Subp. 7. **Game and waterfowl refuges.** All state game refuges closed to
11.12 migratory-waterfowl hunting are closed to taking sandhill cranes under this part. All
11.13 waterfowl refuges closed by posting to taking ducks or geese during any portion of the fall
11.14 waterfowl seasons are closed to taking sandhill cranes under this part.

11.15 **6240.0640 TAKING COOTS, MOORHENS, DUCKS, AND MERGANSERS.**

11.16 Subpart 1. **Open season.**

11.17 A. Coots, moorhens, ducks, and mergansers may be taken as follows:

11.18 (1) in the North Waterfowl Zone described in part 6240.0620, subpart 2,
11.19 during the 60-day period from September 21 through November 19;

11.20 (2) in the Central Waterfowl Zone described in part 6240.0620, subpart 4,
11.21 during the 60-day period that includes September 21 through September 29 and October 5
11.22 through November 24; and

11.23 (3) in the remainder of the state, during the 60-day period that includes
11.24 September 21 through September 29 and October 5 through November 24.

12.1 B. Blue- and green-winged and cinnamon teal may be taken statewide from
12.2 September 1 through September 5.

12.3 Subp. 2. Daily limits.

12.4 A. In any one day, a person may not take more than six ducks, five mergansers,
12.5 and a total of 15 coots and moorhens.

12.6 B. The daily limit of ducks, other than mergansers, may not include more than:

12.7 (1) four mallards, including two female mallards;

12.8 (2) one pintail;

12.9 (3) two redheads;

12.10 (4) three wood ducks;

12.11 (5) two black ducks; and

12.12 (6) two canvasbacks.

12.13 C. The limit of scaup is one per day through October 10 and two per day the
12.14 remainder of the duck season.

12.15 D. The daily limit of mergansers may not include more than two hooded
12.16 mergansers.

12.17 **6240.0950 TAKING GEESE.**

12.18 Subpart 1. Open season. Geese may be taken as follows:

12.19 A. statewide during the early goose season. The early goose season is a special
12.20 season for which a special season goose license is required under Minnesota Statutes, section
12.21 97B.802;

13.1 B. in the North Waterfowl Zone described in part 6240.0620, subpart 2, September
 13.2 21 through December 21;

13.3 C. in the Central Waterfowl Zone described in part 6240.0620, subpart 4,
 13.4 September 21 through September 29 and October 5 through December 26; and

13.5 D. in the remainder of the state, during the 60-day period that includes September
 13.6 21 through September 29 and October 5 through December 26.

13.7 Subp. 2. **Daily limit.** The bag limit for dark geese is five combined and the bag limit
 13.8 for light geese is 20 combined during any open season. Dark geese are Canada, cackling,
 13.9 brant, and white-fronted geese. Light geese are snow, blue, and Ross's geese.

13.10 **6240.1850 REFUGES OPEN TO TAKING GEESE.**

13.12 **Subp. 2. Game refuges.**

13.13 ~~A. The following refuges are open to goose hunting during the first two days of~~

 13.15 ~~Game Refuge in Watonwan County~~ is open to goose hunting during the first two days of
 13.16 the regular goose season.

13.17 B. The Fox Lake Game Refuge is open to goose hunting ~~for~~ from the last ~~seven~~
 13.18 ~~days~~ day of the statewide duck season through the end of the goose season. ~~There is no~~
 13.19 ~~goose hunting within 100 yards of Fox and Temperence Lakes.~~

13.20 **Subp. 3. Waterfowl refuges.**

13.22 B. The Mud-Bardwell Waterfowl Refuge in Martin County is open to Canada
 13.23 goose hunting from the Saturday on or nearest ~~November 1~~ October 9 to the end of the
 13.24 goose season. ~~There is no goose hunting within 100 yards of Mud and Bardwell Lakes.~~

14.1 **6240.2000 MIGRATORY WATERFOWL FEEDING AND RESTING AREA**
 14.2 **RESTRICTIONS.**

14.4 Subp. 4. **Use of electric motors.** On the lakes listed in items A to ~~J~~K, a person may
 14.5 use an electric motor with battery power of 12 volts or less within the designated migratory
 14.6 waterfowl feeding and resting area during the open waterfowl season:

 14.14 and 7; 6230.0700; 6230.0800, subparts 1, 2, 4, 5, 6, and 7; 6230.0900, subparts 2, 4, 5, and
 14.15 6; 6230.1000; 6230.1100; 6240.1150, subpart 2; 6240.1200, subparts 3, 4, and 5; and
 14.16 6240.1800, subpart 1, are repealed.

14.17 **EFFECTIVE PERIOD.** The emergency amendments to Minnesota Rules, parts 6230.0100,
 14.18 6230.0400, 6230.0500, 6230.0600, 6230.0900, 6234.0800, 6240.0100, 6240.0200, 6240.0250,
 14.19 6240.0610, 6240.1850, and 6240.2000, and the repealer expire January 30, 2025. After the
 14.20 emergency amendments expire, the permanent rules as they read before those amendments
 14.21 again take effect, except as they may be amended by permanent rule. Minnesota Rules,

Notice is hereby given that the above entitled rules have been adopted through the process prescribed by *Minnesota Statutes*, section 84.027, subdivision 13(b). The statutory authority for the content of the rules is *Minnesota Statutes*, sections 84.027, subdivision 13(a), 97A.091, subdivision 2; 97A.092; 97A.137, subdivision 2; 97A.401, subdivision 5; 97B.105; 97B.112; and 97B.731, subdivision 1(b).

The following conditions do not allow compliance with *Minnesota Statutes*, sections 97A.0451 to 97A.0459: Waterfowl hunting season dates are based on annual determinations of season timing and selection of options as allowed under federal frameworks for migratory bird hunting. Provisions allowing or prohibiting taking waterfowl on refuges are based on local annual population assessments that show whether a harvestable surplus of ducks or geese exists.

State game refuges open to taking geese are adjusted on a regular basis to reflect changing use by Canada goose populations. Additions to the list of Migratory Waterfowl Feeding and Resting Areas where electric motors may be used during waterfowl season allows additional access and hunting opportunity while maintaining substantial areas of undisturbed waterfowl habitat.

Modifications to controlled hunting zones (CHZs) have been implemented in response to annual harvest data showing declining use by hunters due in part to changes in goose abundance and fall staging patterns.

Falconry season changes standardize opening and closing dates with firearms seasons for waterfowl and provide additional days after the firearms season to reach the maximum number of falconry hunting days allowed under the federal framework.

Regulations prohibiting the take of teal on certain rice beds within the Leech Lake and White Earth Reservations address tribal concerns about interference between hunters and *manoomin* (wild rice) harvesters during the early teal season. During the early teal season (Sept. 1-5), hunters will be restricted from hunting in an area one-half mile from rice beds posted as open for ricing by tribal authorities when hunting within the boundaries of the Leech Lake tribal reservation. During the early teal season (Sept. 1-5), hunters will be restricted from hunting on rice beds posted as open for ricing by tribal authorities when hunting within the boundaries of the White Earth tribal reservation.

Amendments governing migratory bird seasons include: (a) setting dates for the early goose season; (b) setting shooting hours to allow duck hunters to begin shooting one-half hour before sunrise on the opening day of duck season, which is consistent with federal waterfowl regulations; (c) setting shooting hours to begin one-half hour later during the early teal season to prevent misidentification by hunters; (d) increasing the possession limit for harvested migratory waterfowl to be consistent with federal regulations; (e) providing allowances for the use of watercraft in certain areas during the waterfowl seasons; (f) setting a mourning dove season that reflects an expansion in the federal framework introduced by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service; (g) setting a youth waterfowl hunting day that is consistent with federal regulations; and (h) setting open seasons, limits, and restricted areas for the sandhill crane, coot, moorhen, duck, merganser, and goose seasons. Each of these seasonal variables are required to be adjusted on an annual basis based upon current biological and harvest data.
