Dear Chief Justice Magnuson and Administrator Dosal,

This letter is to inform the Supreme Court pursuant to *Minnesota Statutes*, section 2.722 that the following judges are not seeking reelection:

M. Nichael Monahan, an incumbent judge in the Second Judicial District Kenneth A. Sandvik, an incumbent judge in the Sixth Judicial District Thomas G. Armstrong, an incumbent judge in the Tenth Judicial District

Minnesota Statutes, section 2.722, subd. 4(b) states:

(b) If a judge of district court fails to timely file an affidavit of candidacy and filing fee or petition in lieu of a fee, the official with whom the affidavits of candidacy are required to be filed shall notify the Supreme Court that the incumbent judge is not seeking reelection.

Minnesota Statutes, section 204B.09, subdivision 1(d), provides:

(d) Affidavits and petitions for county offices must be filed with the county auditor of that county. Affidavits and petitions for federal offices must be filed with the secretary of state. Affidavits and petitions for state offices must be filed with the secretary of state or with the county auditor of the county in which the candidate resides.

(emphasis added).

A candidate could file for a District Court in any county within the state in which they reside, as pursuant to Article VII, section 6 of the Minnesota Constitution, a candidate need reside in the district for only 30 days prior to the election. However, the Office of the Secretary of State is responsible for certifying candidates for state and federal office, *Minnesota Statutes* section 204D.06 and maintains the Election Reporting System, which gathers all filings with county auditors.

Judge M. Michael Monahan and Judge Kenneth A. Sandvik did not file affidavits of candidacy.

Judge Thomas G. Armstrong filed an affidavit of candidacy for reelection to Seat 3, Tenth Judicial District, with the Washington County Auditor on May 18, 2010. On June 2, 2010, Judge Armstrong filed an affidavit of withdrawal and at that point was no longer a candidate for reelection. Copies of the affidavits of candidacy and withdrawal are attached.
